# Beyond the Book Activities <br> Mmm Cookies By Robert Munsch 

## Parents/Caregivers: Why do books matter? It all comes down to ABCs.

- A child deserves to be prepared: Educators emphasize that reading with your preschool child is one of the most important activities to prepare them for kindergarten.
- Books are essential: Studies by the National Assessment of Educational Progress organization have consistently found that the more reading material available in the home, the better students' reading levels are likely to be.
- Cost of children not being prepared: According to the Wilder Research, in Minnesota, the cost of children entering kindergarten unprepared is approximately $\$ 113$ million annually to school systems due to increased:
- Student aid
- Special education and grade repetition
- Teacher related costs
- Impact on school safety due to delinquent behavior

## Supplies Needed

Activity 1

- Jar
- Brown paper
- Notecards


## Activity 2

- Paper
- Circle shapes
- Markers
- Scissors
- Stickers (optional)
- Crayons


## Activity 3

- Brown construction paper
- Scissors
- Notecards
*Read book before getting ready for each activity.


## Activity 1: Cookie Jar

Supplies you'll need: Cookie Jar (a plastic jar or box works well), cookies (brown/tan paper cut into circles work well) and number cards 1-10 (notecards with numbers written on them work great)

## Directions:

- Review the number cards with your and place them number side up on the table or floor.
- Place several cookie cut outs in a wide mouth plastic jar and put the lid on loosely.
- Invite your child to open the jar and count the cookies inside.
- Challenge your child to find the number card that matches the number of cookies that were in the jar.


## Activity 2: Cookies

Supplies you'll need: Circle shapes (used to trace), white paper, stickers (optional), crayons, markers, scissors

## Directions:

- Show your child the cover of the book.
- Ask them to describe the big cookie.
- Explain to your child they are going to make their own paper cookies.
- Invite your child to trace a circle (or other shapes) on white paper.
- Let them decorate the "cookies" with markers, crayons, stickers, dots, etc.
- Have your child cut out their cookies.
- Have your child describe their cookies to you.


## Activity 3: Star Sprinkles

Supplies you'll need: Number cards (1-10 written on notecards work great) and brown construction paper

## Directions:

- Review number cards 1-10 with your child.
- Create a large "plain cookie" by tracing and cutting out a large circle on brown paper.
- Show your child the "plain cookie."
- Then show your child the cover of the book.
- Discuss how that cookie has fun shaped sprinkles.
- Point out the star sprinkles on the cookie on the cover of the book.
- Have your child count the stars on the cookie.
- Have your child choose a number card and put that amount of star sprinkles on the "plain cookie."
- Remove the star sprinkles and have the child choose a new number card and repeat the process with the new number.
