Beyond the Book Activities Mrs. Wishy-Washy's Farm By Joy Cowley

Parents/Caregivers: Why do books matter? It all comes down to ABCs.

- <u>A child deserves to be prepared</u>: Educators emphasize that reading with your preschool child is one of the most important activities to prepare them for kindergarten.
- <u>Books are essential</u>: Studies by the National Assessment of Educational Progress organization have consistently found that the more reading material available in the home, the better students' reading levels are likely to be.
- <u>Cost of children not being prepared</u>: According to the Wilder Research, in Minnesota, the cost of children entering kindergarten unprepared is approximately \$113 million annually to school systems due to increased:
 - Student aid
 - Special education and grade repetition
 - Teacher related costs
 - Impact on school safety due to delinquent behavior

Utilize the following activities to take you and your child(ren) beyond the book you just read.

Supplies Needed

Activity 1

- Toilet paper rolls or plastic cups
- Straws
- Blue paint
- Paper plates
- Newspaper
- Paper

Activity 2

- String
- Notecards

Activity 3

- White paper
- Crayons
- Glue
- Scissors

Activity 4

- Clear plastic cup
- Cotton balls
- Notecards

^{*}Read book before getting ready for each activity.



Activity 1: Bubbles

Supplies you'll need: Small plastic cups or toilet paper rolls, straws, blue paint, paper plates, white paper and newspaper

Directions:

- Put newspaper down on your work surface.
- Give your child a piece of white paper.
- Put small amounts of blue paint on a paper plate.
- Instruct your child to turn the plastic cups upside down in the paint. This will make a round bubble shape on their white piece of paper.
 - o Repeat with different size shapes, i.e. toilet paper rolls, straws, etc.

Activity 2: In the Tub

Supplies you'll need: String and number cards 1-6 (numbers written on notecards work great)

Directions:

- Take a picture walk through the book and discuss what animals are in the tub.
- Lay the string out on the floor in a circle, and pretend it is the scrub tub.
- Using the number cards, have your child pick a number card.
- Have your child identify the number on the card.
- Then, have your child get in the "tub."
- Discuss who got in first, next and last. NOTE: If several children are not available for this activity you could use stuffed animals or other favorite children toys.


Activity 3: Triangles

Supplies you'll need: White paper (2 pieces), crayons, glue and scissors

Directions:

- Have your child look at the cover of the book and discuss the shapes in the animals' faces. Examples, the duck's beak looks like a triangle or the pig's ears could be triangles.
- On a sheet of white paper trace the shapes 1 large circle, 1 medium oval, 2 small ovals and 2 triangles.
- Have your child color the shapes on the sheet.
- Have your child cut out the shapes and then place them to look like the face of a pig.
- Have your child glue their shapes down on the remaining sheet of paper.





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Activity 4: Bubbles in the Tub

Supplies you'll need: Clear plastic cups, cotton balls and number cards 1-6

Directions:

- Show your child the page in the book where the tub is empty.
- Point out how on the next page the tub is full of bubbles and a cow.
- Give your child one of the number cards and an empty, clear cup.
- Using plastic cups as "scrub tubs" and cotton balls as "bubbles," have your child fill a "tub with bubbles." Direct them to put the correct number of "bubbles," according to their number cards, in their "tubs."
- Once complete, you can dump out the "bubbles" and pick a new number card to play again.
